Murmurings from the Manse

A Monk and a Nun get married...

Not the beginnings of a joke but the start of a marriage which was in essence a blueprint for clergy marriage of its time.

The marriage of Martin and Katharina Luther in many ways defied the odds, and this coming October, when we commemorate the 500th anniversary of the beginnings of the Reformation I wonder how much will be made of this side of the man who changed the direction of faith in Europe and who is studied by theologians and historians alike.

Someone who worked for many years with the World Alliance of Reformed Churches has urged clergy to remember Katharina in any commemorations they might be holding, urging that whilst her influence on the Reformation isn't great, her influence and support of her husband was tremendous and the Reformation would possibly have been the poorer without her.

It is an interesting thought, not in that we can or should rewrite history but that does not mean we should not re-evaluate it in the light of new evidence or new ideas, and having studied Luther specifically as the architect of the Reformation, I think Luther as husband and father would offer a very different side to the man.

I also think ignoring those "behind-the-scenes" narrows our conversation and understanding, we focus so much on the face of or the main driver of a project or organization that we fail to adequately recognise the contribution made by the others.

We are more than one individual, more than one local church, more than a Synod, more than a Denomination, the Reformed Tradition is worldwide. I wonder if Martin Luther ever considered how great his vision would be? And I wonder if Katharina knew, but didn't tell, just supported, quietly.
