Murmurings from the Manse

Most royal weddings have a particular point of interest, apart from the dress that is, and the recent royal wedding did not disappoint!

However, it is doubtful if anyone thought the biggest talking point would be the address given by Bishop Michael Curry of the US Episcopal Church, and yet that is what happened.

I didn't watch the wedding, but soon after my Twitter timeline was alive – and whilst a few were negative about the Bishop, the majority were nearly as enthusiastic in their reaction as the Bishop was in St. George's chapel.

Why? What did the man say that has made such an impact? And perhaps most importantly, why is anyone surprised that a Bishop of the Episcopal Church was a dynamic preacher?

So let's consider a few of the lines from his address -

"There's power in love to show us the way to live."
"Someone once said that Jesus began the most revolutionary

movement in human history."

"we must discover love, the redemptive power of love. And when we do that, we will make of this old world, a new world."

These are not revolutionary statements, nothing we haven't heard before, but everyone seems to be talking about them. Was it his exuberance? His delivery? The way in which his address broke all the accepted conventions of what we expect at a royal wedding?

Or simply – could it be his faith which shone through so brightly as to infect all those listening.

And how, the day before the church celebrated Pentecost, how apt it was to hear in plain simple language what it means to live a Spirit-full life.

One denomination quickly produced a response to the Bishop, suggesting questions their clergy may be asked and how they may respond – was that necessary? Wouldn't it be a more honest response to say, "that's what it means to know Jesus and have a relationship with him."

So what did you think of the Bishop?
And more pertinently what do you think Jesus would have thought?
